

Mrs. Walter Crow Passes In Her 72nd Year

The death occurred early Monday, May 27, 1967, of Mrs. Walter Crow at the Bruce Peninsula and District Memorial Hospital at Warton.

The late Mrs. Crow was born April 3rd, 1895, Augusta Hannah Holler, second daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. Andrew Holler of Melvor Settlement.

Following her marriage to Walter Crow, Sept. 30, 1908, they resided on the homestead at Adamsville until a few years ago when their son Howard took over the management of the farm work and the couple retired to a new home built on the farm.

Mrs. Crow, a member of the United Church, was a kindly person with a deep love for order and beauty; a loving wife and mother and a good friend.

Last December she underwent major surgery and recovered quite well. In February she contracted pneumonia and while recovering from the malady did not regain her usual vigor and declined gradually until death came as a release to her suffering.

Left to mourn her loss, are her devoted husband and children: Stanley of Eastnor Township, Howard on the homestead, and Wilda at home. There are seven grandchildren. Four sisters and two brothers survive.

The funeral was held from her home, Wednesday, May 29th, at 2 p.m. Her pastor, Rev. J. McFadden of Adamsville United Church, brought a comforting message to the bereaved from the Book of Corinthians; he read a favourite hymn of Mrs. Crow's, "Under His Wings". The 23rd Psalm was sung and "Lead Me Gently Home" was sung as a solo.

The profusion of floral tributes were carried by the grandchildren, nieces and nephews and other young friends of Mrs. Crow's.

Pall-bearers were all nephews: Clendon Hamley, Neville and Walter Forbes, Arthur, Malcolm and Edward White.

Interment took place in the family plot at Colpo's Bay Cemetery.

Relatives were present from Clinton, Hanover, Kitchener, Hamilton, Toronto, Buffalo, and Wyandotte, Mich.

The service was held on November 16th at the Shouldice Funeral Home, Lion's Head, with Rev. Mr. Scott in charge. Mrs. Watson was an Anglican in religion. The many flowers were carried by grandchildren and friends.
