

wooded islands,...this presumably the Chenaux...then, “at the end of this tract Bissett’s ‘chantier’, a solitary, log-house with a few cleared acres, relieves the eye after the monotony of the vast solitudes; it affords also a welcome asylum to the fur and timer traders.”

By the time the first census was taken in 1842, no record of either Bulless or Bissett appeared. Quinn’s map of 1825 shows that Bulless Point is the exact location of what later became known as Bonnechere Point. Bissett’s Point later became the location of the C.C. Johnston stone house, later owned by Mr. and Mrs. Clayton Scharfe, and presently owned by Mr. and Mrs. John Purdon (2006).....*Owen Quinn.*
