## SUGGESTIONS FOR SELECTING EXHIBITS

**GRAIN**—Select uniform sample of large plump seed, removing broken kernels, weed seeds, all other kinds of grain and inert material.

**SHEAF**—Select straws of good length, free from disease, having heads well filled. Prepare each sheaf by placing heads evenly and tying with tane or cord, then removing all dried leaves and trim butts off evenly.

**CORN**—Select ears uniform and medium in size, straight rows, well filled at tips and butts.

**CORN**—(Ensilage purposes). Large stalks having well filled ears.

**POTATOES**—Select tubers true to variety, uniform in size and shape and free from sunburn, bruises, scab or any other disease.

**ONIONS**—Select specimens uniform in size, well matured and free from thick neck. Do not peel.

**BEETS**—Select specimens uniform in color, shape and size. (not to exceed 3 inches in diameter), free from side roots, cracking or any signs of disease.

**CARROTS**—Select specimens uniform in size and shape, free from sunburn or discoloration, side roots, cracks or any form of disease.

**MANGELS AND TURNIPS**—Select large, smooth, uniform specimens, free from cracks or signs of disease. True to variety, (roots to be for stock feeding).

**PARSNIPS**—Roots straight, fair length, broadly shouldered, free from side roots, discoloration or disease.

## CERTIFICATE OF HONOR

A Certificate of Honor will be given to the pupil in each School winning the highest number of points at the Fair.

## SHIELD

A Shield will be awarded, except where a special trophy is awarded, to the school winning the highest number of points in proportion to the average attendance at the time seeds were ordered. This shield or trophy must be won three times before it becomes the permanent property of any one school.

## RULES AND REGULATIONS

1. Competition is open to all pupils who have attended public school in their respective School Fair Districts at least one month since January 1st, 1929, or in attendance at time of Fair.

2. No entry fee will be charged for any exhibit and no pupil may have more than one entry in any one class except Live Stock.

3. All exhibits in classes 1 to 31, except 9, 10, 11 and 18, must be the product of material supplied by the Department.

4. Exhibits should be in place by 10.30 a.m. so that judging may commence at 11.00 a.m. and must not be removed until notified by the management. **Absolutely no exhibits accepted after 11.00 a.m.**

5. All exhibits must be the work and property of the exhibitor, and in case of dispute the pupils must show a certificate from parents or teacher that the work is entirely their own, otherwise no prize will be given.

6. All entry tickets must be filled out with the pupil's name, township, number of the school section and number of class in which exhibit is made, and securely fastened to the exhibit. Entry tickets will be mailed out previous to the day of the Fair.

7. Articles exhibited in 1928 must not be shown in 1929.

8. Any person found breaking any rules of the Fair will not receive a prize.

9. The percentage of prize money arranged through the Department will be paid by cheque to teachers on the day of the Fair. The percentage to be paid by the section must also, according to agreement, be paid by the secretary on that day.

N.B.—Note particularly Rule 4—Exhibits must this year be placed by time stated.
