

PRIZE LIST

Parents are urged to allow the children to do all the work in preparing their exhibits without assistance. Encourage them in every way but remember that the work you do for them helps to defeat the object of the School Fair, which is to teach the boys and girls to do things themselves. Let parents, teachers and pupils cooperate whole-heartedly with the Department in stamping out entirely any grounds for criticism of dishonest exhibits. It is the Children's Fair; help them to make it a success. Bring your lunch basket and arrange to spend the day with the children.

Exhibits shown in sections 1—31 inclusive must have been grown from seed supplied by the Department in 1929, except with potatoes and class 18.

Prizes in all classes and sections:—50c., 35c., 20c., 10c., 10c., ribbon, unless otherwise specified.

Grain to be exhibited in quart jars.

LIVE STOCK

All Live Stock must have been born on or after January 1, 1929, and must be the property of the parent or guardian since birth. Colts and Calves must be halter broken and shown on the halter by the exhibitor. Pup's ability to show animal to count 40%.

40. 1 Calf—(Beef Type) (Nurse), \$1.25, \$1.00, 75c.
41. 1 Calf—(Beef Type) (pail fed), \$1.25, \$1.00, 75c.

FRUIT

Apples in this class to be selected by exhibitor but need not necessarily come from home orchard.

43. Wealthies—5 apples.

46. Tomatoes (ripe)—5 specimens, any table variety.
47. Apple Collection, six varieties, ranging from early fall to winter, three of each, named; varieties chosen, as well as quality of apples, considered.

NOTE:—No prizes will be given in classes 48 to 65 inclusive unless a certificate signed by the parent, guardian, or teacher, stating that the work was done exclusively by the exhibitor is attached to the exhibit.

BAKING

48. White Bread—Single loaf.
49. Bran Muffins—½ dozen.

51. Light Cake—Recipe: 2 eggs, 1 cup white sugar, ½ cup butter (creamed), ½ cup milk, 2 cups (sifted) flour, 2 teaspoons baking powder, ½ teaspoon vanilla.

53. Dressed Doll, 8 inches to 10 (11 years and under) hand made.
54. Clothes Pin Bag (11 years and under) hand made.
55. Work Apron with at least one buttonhole, hand made.
56. Guest Towel, hemstitched and initial, machine made.
57. Plain Kimona Night Dress, machine made.

MANUAL TRAINING

(Exhibits must not be painted)

58. Bird House—Utility, workmanship and appearance considered.
59. Nail Box, with handle and partitions (10 years and under).

60. Model of Mash Hopper for chickens.
61. Any other model in wood. Must be new.

COLLECTIONS

(All to have been made in 1929. Neatness to count)

62. Collection of at least 15 and not more than 30 common weeds, showing roots, and flowers or seeds. Mounted on cardboard and correctly named.
63. Collection of Forage Plants, (clovers and grasses), 10 specimens, mounted and named.
64. Collection of cuts showing common breeds of live stock, mounted and named. (In no case over 2 cuts of a single breed).
65. 12 Mounted Snapshots of rural and farm scenes (purchased postcards disqualify entry).

NOTE:—Entries in sections 66 to 75 inclusive to be done in school under the supervision of the teacher who certifies to the work. The teacher collects all such exhibits in the school and has them forwarded to the Department of Agriculture, Walkerton, not later than June 15th. Exhibits will be judged during the summer holidays.

WRITING

All contestants in writing shall begin their entry with one line each of the compact left oval 2 spaces high, the straight line exercise one space high and "The quick brown fox jumps over the lazy dog," followed by:

66. Primer—Alphabet in capital and small letters, also figures 1—10.
67. First Classes—"The Sunbeam" page 26 in the First Reader.
68. Second Classes—First two verses of "Don't Kill the Birds," page 137, Second Reader.
69. Third Classes—First 3 verses of "The Brook," page 212, Third Reader.
70. Fourth Classes—First 3 verses "Untrodden Ways," page 94, Fourth Reader.

DRAWING

71. Primer—A lemon in crayon.
72. First Classes—A pansy in crayon.
73. Second Classes—Three twigs of pussy willows in crayon.
74. Third Classes—"A Water Scene" in water colors.
75. Fourth Classes—Map in ink of Bruce County, showing townships, railways, and principal towns and villages.

CONTESTS

76. Public Speaking Contest—Open to pupils who have attended school at least one month since January 1st, 1929, in their School Fair district. Four prizes, \$1.25, \$1.00, 75c., 50c.
Five Minute Speech—Contestants to choose subject.
77. School Chorus—Each school must compete as a unit except graded schools, when each room will compete as a unit. Each school or room must have at least 50% of its September enrolment singing. Contestants will sing one verse and chorus of any one of the following:
Teacher may direct but not sing with pupils.
 1. Rule Britannia.
 2. Drink to Me Only with Thine Eyes.
 3. The Old Folks at Home.
 Four prizes, \$1.25, \$1.00, 75c., 50c.

78. First Aid Competition—Open to a team of three from each school or room. Each member of the team will take his or her turn as patient, the others doing the work.
 1. Demonstrate artificial respiration following accident by drowning or electrical shock, Schafer method.
 2. Demonstrate first aid treatment to revive person who has fainted.

NOTE:—After demonstration is given one member of the team will tell the audience what is done and why.

Team prizes: 1st, \$1.50; 2nd, \$1.05; 3rd, 75c.

79. Weed Naming Contest—Contestants will be required to identify and write names of 15 common weeds.

SCHOOL PARADE

80. Three prizes on total points—\$2.00, \$1.25, 75c.
Additional prizes will be awarded for various phases of parades as follows: Marching, \$1.00, 50c.; Banner, 50c., 25c.; School song or yell, 50c., 25c.
Parade of schools around the grounds in reverse order of schools as listed on prize list. For prizes on total points basis of scoring will be as follows: 1, Marching, 40 points. 2, Arrangement, 25 points (placing of scholars in ranks, attitude while standing at attention, behaviour of school throughout the parade and general appearance, no points given for elaborate dress). 3, Banner, 20 points. 4, School song or yell, 15 points.

Text: Syllabus of Physical Training for Schools, 1919.
Each exercise to be done once.

1. Introductory Exercises:
 - (a) Foot placing sideways (hips firm)
 - (b) Lunging forward (hips firm). *left ft. lunging outwards*
 - (c) Head bending sideways (feet astride, hips firm).
2. Trunk Exercises:
 - (a) Trunk bending forward and downward (arms upward stretch).
 - (b) Trunk bending forward and backward (neck rest).
3. Arm Exercises:
 - (a) Arm stretching upward, sideways and downwards.
 - (b) Alternate arm stretching upward and downward. *arms high 1-2*
4. Balance Exercises:
 - (a) Knee full bending with arm stretching sideways.
 - (b) Arm flinging with heels raise.
5. Shoulder Blade Exercises:
 - (a) Arms flinging (arms across bend). *left to right*
 - (b) Arm turning outward and inward. *1-2*
6. Trunk Turning and Bending Sideways:
 - (a) Trunk turning sideways (hips firm).
 - (b) Trunk bending sideways (arm sideways stretch).
7. Breathing Exercises:

Breathing. Arm parting. (Arms forward raise). *deep breathing to numbers 1-1*
