If it seems as if there was less need for the snowblower this year, you're not imagining things.


Environment Canada says this winter has been the warmest in

Canada since nationwide record-keeping began in 1948. "Statistically, in an unchanging climate, Canada could expect a winter anomaly like this winter's about every 100 years," the ministry said in a bulletin reported by CBC News Online.

Temperatures this winter have averaged 3.9°C above normal. Most of the country was at least 2°C above normal and with Alberta, Saskatchewan and the Northwest Territories all experienced temperatures greater than 6°C above normal.
