

Lot 13, Concession 1, was taken from the Crown by Donald Wilkie. In September 1880 it was sold to Andrew Vogt. The farm was occupied by his son, John, who was the owner of the first traction steam engine in this district.

Mr. and Mrs. John Vogt moved to Port Elgin about the year 1909. The farm was rented to Mr. George Hammond for a short time.

Andrew Vogt died in 1912, and in October 1913 the Landed Banking and Loan Company of Hamilton offered the farm for sale.

In June 1914 it was purchased by Mr. John Coulter. In November 1919, he sold to George Jamieson and Arthur C. Whetham.

In May 1921, Arthur Whetham sold his interest to George Jamieson. In 1944, George Jamieson gave the farm to his daughter, Mary, Mrs. Orville Hibey.

In June 1954, it was purchased by Moffatt Jamieson.
