"In 1959, one of our members, Mrs. Jas. McEwing, brought honour to our community by placing third in a competition for composing the words and music for an appropriate Institute song. This was a Provincial contest with the entries of 1st and 2nd prize winners going on to the Dominion contest.

Following are the words of her song:
