

MRS. JOHN McCULLOCH.

The death occurred on January 10th, 1950, of Mrs. John McCulloch. She was the former Margaret Allen of Elderslie, but came to live in Saugeen Township, after her marriage to John McCulloch in 1907.

The community was shocked on Saturday, September 2nd, 1950, to learn of the sudden passing in Saugeen Memorial Hospital of Mrs. Charles Kelly. Although she had been confined to the hospital for the past three weeks, her condition had been steadily improving, until it took a sudden turn on Saturday afternoon.

Mrs. Kelly, whose maiden name was Annie E. Cairns, was a daughter of the late William Cairns and Christena McKinnon, and was born on the 2nd Concession of Saugeen, on August 19th, 1884. She attended school at S. S. #5 Saugeen, Port Elgin High School and Toronto Normal School. She taught school for a number of years, and on April 2nd, 1919, she was united in marriage to Charles Kelly of the town-line, Bruce and Saugeen, where they have resided ever since.

Besides her husband, she is survived by one daughter (Isobel), Mrs. James E. Bell,

Concession 2, Saugeen and one son, Charles W., at home, also one sister, Mrs. Thos. A. Howe, of Port Elgin. There are two grandchildren.

Throughout her life, Mrs. Kelly took a very active part in community life, in Red Cross during both World Wars, in the Women's Institute, St. Andrew's United Church W. M. S., and Sunday School, where she had been a teacher right up until the last.

The funeral was held on Tuesday, with a private service at the home at 2.00 o'clock, and service at St. Andrew's United Church at 2.30. The minister, Rev. W. H. Martin was in charge of the service. A comforting message in song was brought by Mrs. Stanley Ribey singing "Good Night".

Pallbearers were Harold Sutherland, John McKinnon, John Bell, Hugh McGillivray, Ross Currie, and William Forrester.

Interment was in Sanctuary Park, Port Elgin.
