Alexander Smith's passing robs Canada
of one of its best informed students of national politics, the city of Ottawa of one of its most picturesque and popular citizens, and the Liberal party of one of its staunchest and most valued adherents. Alexander Smith was a Liberal. He approached Lib-eralism not merely as a manifestation of party politics, but as a guiding principle

"Liberalism," he could write, "has its foundation in principle, in conviction, in ideals. Apart from these Liberalism is noth-What is more, he thoroughly believed it. Liberalism was to him a state of mind, and he lived it. A party man if ever there was one, he was yet a party man devoid of partisan characteristics, as commonly understood. He never became bitter or abusive. He philosophized when others fumed. He took defeat as camly as he took victory-and he took a measure of each.

For more than thirty years, Alexander Smith was a power in Dominion election affairs. As an organizer of campaigns in this country, he had no parallel. When he ceased as an active organizer, he turned to writing, preparing speakers' hand-books and party pamphlets, ammunition fired from hundreds of throats in successive contests. These revealed the scope of his knowledge and the extent of his experience. They also revealed the sincerity of his devotion to a political faith. His mind was always an every-ready compendium of facts and figures relating to party matters in the history of Canada. He was steeped in the lore of political war-

Ottawa people enjoyed the honor of hav ing Mr. Smith as a fellow-citizen for the last twenty-four years. The large number which personally knew Mr. Smith will testify to his personal qualities. For a man whose life work was so largely dedicated to advancing the fortune of one of the great parties, he was singularly free from those traits which tradition has attached to the party devotee. Did one not know, it would have been an easy matter to talk to him regularly over a number of years and never discover just how dear to his heart was the cause of one of the parties. Because beyond his party leanings and his enthusiastic Liberalism was always that power of detachment which made him so agreeable and rare a partisar
