EARL L. MACREADY PASSES AFTER SHORT ILLNESS

Following an illness of short duration, Earl Lee Macready of Port Elgin, passed away in the Saugeen Memorial Hospital, Southampton, on August 15th, 1970. He was 75 years of age.

Born in South Bend, Indiana on November 26, 1894, Mr. Mcready came to Canada in 1930 and made his home in the Port Elgin area.

In earlier and healthier days, he was very active in sports and curling, and was a past president

of the Port Elgin Curling Club. Possessed of a very creative mind, he invented the Macready Ice Brush, the patent for which was eventually purchased by the Stevens-Hepner Co. Ltd. Mr. Mcready was a salesman for the company for many years.

He is survived by his wife, Catherine, and one daughter, Helene, Mrs. Eugene Mann, North Bruce, two grandchildren and was predeceased by one brother, Oliver.

In former years, Mr. Mcready resided at North Bruce and operated the Elbow Inn restaurant.

The funeral was held from the Davey Funeral Chapel on Monday, August 17, 1970, with Rev. Ross Cumming officiating.

DONALD M. LAMONT, Prominent Saugeen Town- ship Native, Passes at Brucelea Haven, Walkerton

The many friends of the Lamont family were grieved to learn of the death of Donald (Dan) McTavish Lamont, 82, a highly respected and well-known descendant of a pioneer Saugeen Township family.

Mr. Lamont died suddenly, Tuesday morning, February 16th, 1971, in Brucelea Haven, Walkerton, where he had resided for the past year.

He was born in Saugeen Township, December 23rd, 1888, the son of the late Alexander and Florence (McTavish) Lamont. Married in Toronto in 1916 to Florence Webster of Tiverton, they made their home on the 2nd Concession of Saugeen Township. Mrs. Lamont passed away in 1958.

Mr. Lamont served as Treasurer of Saugeen Township for 20 years, and as Reeve for 8 years. In 1956 he was elected Warden of Bruce County. He was a past President of the Port Elgin Agricultural Society; a member of the Port Elgin Branch 340, Royal Canadian Legion, of which he was made a Life Member last fall.

A former member of the Port Elgin Rotary Club, he was also active in the War Efforts Society during the Second World War. Mr. Lamont was very interested in politics, and was a staunch Liberal all his life.

For many years he served on the Session of Queen Hill Presbyterian Church, and was later a member of Tolmie Memorial Presbyterian Church, Port Elgin.

He went overseas with the 160th Bruce Battalion during the First World War, and later transferred to the Calgary Unit, Fort Garry Horse, and saw action in France and Belgium.

Mr. Lamont is survived by four sons, Donald, Brampton; Kent and Reeve Alex Lamont of Saugeen Township and Fraser of Bruce Township; also two daughters, Marian, Mrs. Clarence McGillivray of Bruce Township and Janetta,

Mrs. Earl Williamson of Hamilton.

He is also survived by 23 grandchildren; a brother, Alex. Lamont, of Regina, Sask., and a sister, Elizabeth, Mrs. Horace Clark, of Greenock Township, and Florida.

He was predeceased by four sisters, Janet; Margaret, Mrs. John McAndrew, California; Agnes, Mrs. George Hood, Arran Township; and Mary, Mrs. Arthur Campbell, Saugeen Township.

A Memorial Service was conducted on Wednesday evening, February 17th, by the Port Elgin Branch, Royal Canadian Legion. The funeral service was held on Thursday, February 18th, from the Davey Funeral Chapel at 2:30 p.m. with Rev. Maurice D. McNabb officiating. Burial was in Sanctuary Park.
