At the Toronto Airport there was a highly co-ordinated operation set up to aid in transferring McEwing to a small plane. An R.C.M.P. officer complete with drawn gun and walkie-talkie picked McEwing up and immediately took him to the aircraft which brought him here.

McEwing told his welcoming committee that he was very impressed by the tremendous amount of work they have accomplished in such a short time. They have done in two or three months what usually takes a year to plan. He said he really commends the Committee for taking on an event of this magnitude, and hopes it will continue next year. If it does, he will come back each year for our Highland Games.
