"Living, Lasting Legacy" Saugeen Bluffs Park

A large group of dignitaries
rawn from local townships and
presentatives of Saugeen Valley
mservation Authority, plus MP
Gary Gurbin and MPP Bob
Kessock attended the official
ring of the Saugeen Bluffs
pservation Area, June 21. The
histry of Natural Resources,
under whose auspices the SVCA
operates, was represented by Bill
Foster, assistant deputy minister
for Southern Ontario.

The ceremony, held under sunny skies, was attended by a large crowd, including 18 members of the Sutherland Clan, descendants of James Saunders, schoolmaster, postmaster, and first Reeve of Paisley. Also present were representatives of Conservation Authorities such as Upper Thames and Catfish Creek.

Bill Foster, whose section of the Ministry of Natural Resources looks after conservation authorities, noted, although only established 35 years ago, these bodies now control over 300 designated areas and receive 30 million dollars in provincial grants. The Saugeen Valley Conservation Authority has received about \$200,000 from provincial funding o assist in land acquisition and levelopment. Saugeen Bluff's park now has camping and fishing acilities, nature and horse-riding rails, and a multiple use area. SVCA controls 13 conservation areas, on which it is demonstrafing soil, water and resource management and has planted thousands of trees.

He paid tribute to the memory of the late Robert Sutherland, of Sutherland Insurance Co., Guelph, who was a direct descendant of James Saunders, first Reeve of Paisley. Robert Sutherland's anonymous contributions supported the SVCA in its land acquisition programme and, along with provincial funds, made develop-

ment of Saugeen Bluffs possible.

The park is a living memorial to
the foresight and generosity of
this family.

Saugeen Bluffs has already been in use for family camping and organized groups such as Girl Guides and Boy Scouts for about 3 years. It is also home to a maple syrup festival which involves many school groups as well as family visits. The conservation area comprises 507 acres, with 140 serviced sites for tents and small trailers, nature trails, day use areas, organized group campsite, and some pasturage for which local farmers tender. Snowshoe and cross country ski trails are open in winter along with facilities for Boy Scout winter camping.

In all, the Saugeen Valley Conservation Authority looks after 16,900 acres; 13,500 acres are "agreement forests", managed by the Ministry of Natural Resources for timber production and ancillary uses. Other lands are under intensive recreational use or are managed by the SVCA such as Greenock, Swamp.

Private contributions such as those made by the Sutherland family are administered by the SVC Foundation, and are used as designated by the donor. Provincial funding is geared more for water management. About 80 per cent is spent on combatting erosion occurring in the 1,720 square miles of the watershed.

The SVCA employs 25 full time personnel, 20-25 residents in the vicinity of the various Authority lands, who work most of the year, and 37 students hired for the summer to work either on the land or for local municipalities who request SVCA assistance. Port Elgin is considered fortunate in that erosion and related problems are not extensive within town borders.
