In 1947, while residing on the 4th Concession of Saugeen Township, she was instrumental in organizing the South Saugeen branch and served as the first president. Prior to that, she was associated for 30 years with the White School branch. South Saugeen proudly presented Mrs. Black with a Life Membership in December 1957, in recognition of her leadership and dedication. Multi-talent she entered a Tweedsmuir Contest in 1961, composing words and music for an institute song and won honourable mention in the provincial competition.
