

A page out of history books last Sunday

The humidity and the heat of Sunday afternoon failed to deter a large crowd from gathering at Dunblane Church, a few miles east of Port Elgin on the River Road, to mark the conclusion of the Presbyterian Church's 100th year in Canada.

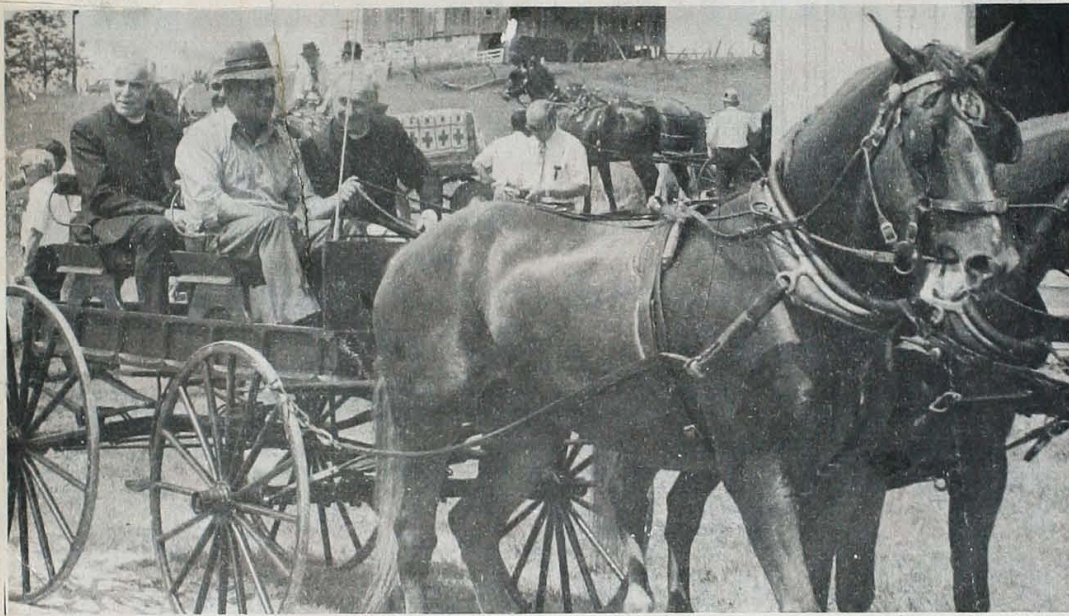
To add to the scene, people arrived at the site by the transportation methods of a century ago - horsedrawn wagons and buggies. Many men and women were dressed in the style of the day of 100 years ago.

Members of the Tolmie Memorial Presbyterian Church in

Port Elgin and the Burgoyne Presbyterian Church met at the 116 year old Presbyterian Church for a special service with the Reverend Hugh F. Davidson, moderator of the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church in Canada, as guest minister. The Reverend R.D. MacDonald, of the two local congregations, conducted the service.

More than 300 people attended the outdoor service. Dunblane Church was closed in 1967 but one service per year has been held there since.

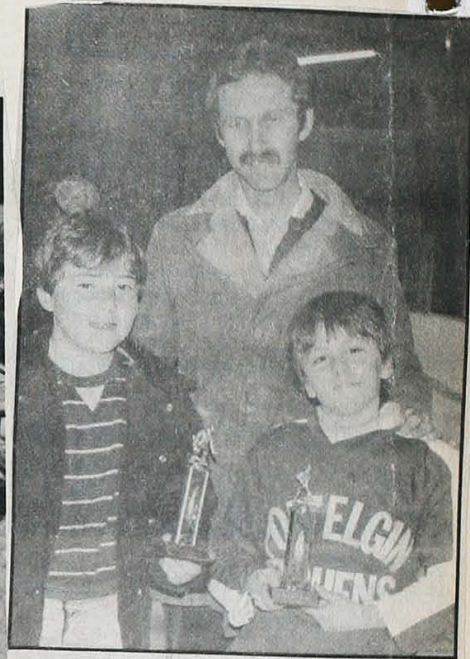
