

History fabric of community

You never know what impressions you are going to make, or what influence your actions will have years after the fact.

One of my grandmother's sayings was that "a hundred years from now, it won't matter." Genuine usually requires that philanthropic solution to everyday problems such as whether the homework would get done on schedule or whether you could find an outfit as smart as the one worn by your friends.

These things obviously don't matter beyond the moment but other actions can make a difference for generations. For example, the decision of an 18-year-old to leave Paisley in Scotland in 1849 and put down roots in Bruce County made a big difference for her and is still prompting unexpected connections.

Marian McGillivray recently published "From City Street to a Trackless Forest," the story of Jane Smith, her great-grandmother and the brave young woman who made the unanticipated journey to the Queen's Bush in the last century. That story appeared here two weeks ago. Since then more information has come from others with a connection to Jane.

In the book, McGillivray briefly notes that Jane married Peter Bartholomew of Bruce Township a few years after arriving at her brother's homestead in Walkerton. The couple farmed at a corner of the 12th concession and 30th side road in Bruce. McGillivray told me she had been to the farm, but had never

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or seen the house.

Now McGillivray will have the chance to at least see a photo of her great-grandmother's home, thanks to Audrey Attey who with her husband Norman turned the former Bartholomew property. Audrey remembers the old log house being dragged from its original location by Deer Creek on the side road and put near the present day farmhouse on the corner for use as a pigsty.

"You could see it was a beautiful house, the stains were gone, but you could see where they were, and all the doors and windows. It was all planed wood inside," Audrey said of the present house.

The Bartholomew house has since been demolished, but a photo of it remains and was used on the cover of a school history project by Attey's grandmother, also called Jane.

I was intrigued by Audrey's information, because it means the original house was less than a mile from where I lived in Bruce. Our school bus route passed the spot twice a day. The road is straight now, but in those days it curved with the creek through a marsh.

"I always... It was the

perfect spot on the farm, and wouldn't it be convenient to get water from the creek," Audrey said.

Audrey said Bartholomew descendants still live in the Walkerton area, and left me curious about a story that one Bartholomew built a clock tower in his barn. More Bartholomew connections came from a Hanover area woman, who recommended Josephine Elizabeth Hulse's book "Name of My Youth" for information on the Bartholomews at Maple Hill and their famous Washington Tower. My father was both a genealogist researcher and a former student of Josephine Hulse, a respected music teacher in Hanover in the early days.

Jane's father must have worried for months, wondering if he had made the right decision in letting his independent daughter leave home and look for a new life in an unknown world. How could he have foreseen that she would not only make a successful journey and raise a large family, but also be the thread that would weave through so many stories about people and places in Bruce?

Threads like the ones in Jane Smith's story help make a strong community fabric. With the help of genealogists, storytellers, family historians and those with a memory for detail or the habit of writing things down, we can have the good fortune of documenting and preserving even more of the connections between people and events in our community.
