## Fashion Notes 1887

wearing 100 years ago? It was an interesting time for fashion, with the advent department stores set up by Timothy Eaton and Robert Simpson, Amercian fashions began to replace the European trends that had until then dressed Canadian women. And not to be left out, Canadian women were showing their own skills at weaving fabrics, leading women in this country into a more individualized styling of their own. Although there was still a dependence on items such as ostrich feathers from South Africa, which added phenomenal height to hats, Canadian-made styles were plentiful enough that there was a move to establish a "Made in Canada" la-bel. In 1887 Owen Sound, coats are highlighted. For women, ulsters--long loose coats with man-tles--for the men, beaver or otter coats, topped with a hard Christie hat. Women were very keen on hair ornaments, and hair pieces that made up their chignons. And while clothes for the most part were still made up at home or by a dressmaker, fabric prices, by today's standards, were unbelievably cheap. Cottons cost 10 cents a yard, the dressier black silks ran to 60 cents a yard. Men's suits sold for 7 dollars, overcoats cost \$3.75, and that most decorative of pieces, the lady's gold watch, sold for a mere 10 dollars.
