



Glasgow United To Celebrate 20th

Glasgow United Church is celebrating its 20th anniversary on Sunday, May 31.

The church was officially opened on the last Sunday in May, 1950, after a year long construction program.

For the opening area residents flooded the church and a loudspeaker was placed in the basement so the overflow crowds there could hear the service.

At the opening service, Rev.

H.S. Cooke of Beachburg, chairman of the Renfrew Presbytery, received the keys of the church from Andrew Hamilton, the chairman of the board of trustees.

Rev. R. G. Newman, the Braeside minister who also served the Glasgow church, made the pastoral prayer. He also read messages of greeting from Rev. G.A. Puttenham of Trenton, a former pastor, and Rev. D.H. Woodhouse of Arnprior.

The Glasgow church choir was accompanied by the late Mrs. Celesta Hamilton at the organ.

An evening service was also filled and Mr. Newman was in charge of the service. He was assisted by Rev. A.E. Taylor of White Lake.

On the Monday evening, a church supper was held followed by a program of entertainment in the Community Hall. Among its participants were Mrs. A. Jahn, Walter Runtz, Archie Murphy and Jack Campbell.

Two visiting clergymen who brought greetings to the supper were Rev. Alexander Mills of Arnprior and Rev. C. Vias of Lochwinnoch.

Originally those in Glasgow Station used to journey to Stewartville and attend services there.

At one time Methodist services were held at the schoolhouse at Lundy's corner.

Services were then held in Davis' Hall over the old blacksmith shop. After 1915 when the community hall was built, church services were held there and the minister from Lochwinnoch would preach there.

There were three marriages at the church in 1950: Miss

Edith Miller and Russell Laval-lee on Sept. 2; Miss Gloria Isabel Russett and William K. Hamilton on Sept. 16; and Miss Jean Storie and Cameron McLaren on Oct. 9.

The first babies christened were Sharon Ruth Forrest, the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. James Forrest and Gwen Maureen Wilson, the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Manly Wilson.
