'Ball of fire' kills boy;

LACHUTE, Que. (CP) — Lightning killed a 16-year-old Ontario boy and injured 30 of his companions during a weekend electrical storm near Lachute, about 40 miles northwest of Montreal.

Evelaine Rieux, 16, of Pembleton, was killed instantly when lightning struck a cluster of three tents, sheltering 33 Plantagent high school students and teachers Saturday.

Leonard Ryan, one of the students in the tent where Evelaine was sleeping, said the group was camping on the summit of Mont St. Jacques as part of a week-long survival training course.

It had been drizzling most of the night, he said, but at about 6:45 a.m. the rain became heavier and

the wind picked up and a crackle of lightning was heard.

"All of a sudden one bolt came through us," he said.

"A girl sitting between me and Evelaine screamed 'I've been hit!"

and everyone started yelling.

"I was paralysed for a few seconds," Mr. Ryan said. "When the lightning hit, my feet flew up and my arms shot out and then for a

few seconds after that everything was in slow motion."

Group leader Nicole Leblanc said "a ball of fire" appeared to hit the camp.

A three-hour attempt to revive Evelaine, by mouth-to-mouth resuscitation failed.

Five of the campers were taken to Lachute hospital for treatment of burns.
