Jean-Paul Charlebois honored Saturday

Memories of a different era

By Richard Mahoney ST-BERNARDIN — Last fall, after 33 years in municipal politics, Jean-Paul Charlebois bowed out of the political arena.

On Saturday, April 25, Charlebois will take a formal bow at a banquet in his honor at the Caledonia community centre in St-Bernardin. The soirée, which begins with cocktails at 6 p.m., is being organized to recognize his 33 years on Caledonia council.

Charlebois, who had been reeve for 23 years, withdrew from last November's race for the ward 1 seat on The Nation Municipality council. At the time, Charlebois criticized the merger of Caledonia, St-Isidore, South Plantagenet and Cambridge which created The Nation. He disagreed with the new ward boundaries and felt amalgamation, which reduced the number of Prescott-Russell municipalities from 18 to eight, was going too far too quickly.

Since then, "I haven't taken any interest in it," says Charlebois. The new municipalities were officially formed in January. "We have to wait a little before we can comment on how it's working," he remarks.

It is fitting that his fête is held in the community centre, which he cites as one of the township's major accomplishments. The

centre was built 20 years ago, when provincial government grants were plentiful, and local politicians routinely rejected any talk of mergers.

"Wintario grants were available for projects then. We built the centre with Wintario grants and volunteer labor. I don't think we will see that again. The money is not there. But I would be surprised to see that kind of volunteer effort again," he comments.

Thanks to volunteers, the community centre has traditionally enjoyed surpluses. "That money was used to improve the park, at no cost to the taxpayers," he says.

Charlebois recalls that as reeve, the township acquired two heavily-subsidized development road projects.

One disappointment is the government's delay in providing Highway 417 access at McCrimmon. "The access is there now but it took too long. During that period, we lost some companies that were interested in building in that area," he relates.

Charlebois recounts that municipal tax rates were reasonable. "The tax rates were always a good average. We didn't want to go too low, because we had to provide services, but we didn't want to put a heavy burden on the taxpayers," he says.
