More than 800 art pieces in exhibit

LINDSAY (Staff) — Spring Reflections this year at the Frost Campus of Sir Sandford Fleming College in Lindsay has an added touch.

Not only are there 575 pieces of artwork produced by continuing education students and faculty, but over 250 pieces belonging to the Ontario Crafts Council Annual Craft Exhibit and Critique. And a good portion of them are for sale.

The double exhibit was officially opened Tuesday night

by Victoria-Haliburton MPP John Eakins, a former member of the college's board of governors.

The collection is made up of fine art pieces from students and faculty in the college's continuing education division and contains ceramics and photography as well as many types of drawing and painting.

The craft exhibit which includes paintings, wall hangings, tapestries, wood-carvings, stain-glass work, ceramics and jewellery

belongs to a competition to be judged Friday by two professional craftsmen, Nancy Lou Patterson, assistant professor of Fine Art at Waterloo University, and Vaughn Stewart of St. Thomas who is a studio potter and instructor at Fanshawe College in London, Ontario.

Competition is for three top prizes of \$300 each, a Sir Sandford Fleming College purchase award of \$250 and one of \$100 from the Ontario Crafts Council.

The two exhibits are housed side by side and are open for viewing through Saturday.

Continuing education officer for Frost Campus, Kent Garrett said he felt the quality of the over 800 pieces of art is phenomenal. "I got a beautiful gut feeling that all of it is good."

Kawartha Arts and Crafts Association has played an active role in bringing the central Ontario crafts council exhibit to Lindsay this year.

Accommodation for the visiting artists was arranged

free of charge in the members' homes and association members are looking after the weekend activities including a Saturday afternoon buffet.

As well, this is Continuing Education Week in Lindsay and the theme, art in the community, will prevail Thursday from 11:30 a.m. to 1:30 p.m. in front of the town hall at the corner of Kent and Cambridge streets.

French cooking will be demonstrated and instructor Adeline Gailling will be on

hand to demonstrate pottery work, along with Barbara Harris and her weaving and Robert Daniels illustrating wood carving. Miss Gailling will teach Ceramics for Youth this fall.

Mr. Garrett says there is only one summer course this year, a three-week daytime program in biblical studies running from July 5 to 23.

"Hopefully next summer there will be more courses," he says and adds that it's definitely something they're working on.
