WIARTON - Oh my, my, can't get enough of that homemade pie. The women of the Wiarton and District Agriculture Society had the most popular booth in the en-

tire community centre at the town's annual fall fair Saturday. Crowds were packed 16-deep at the counter, craning their necks around a partition to see what delectable indulgences awaited

Not your simple slap-togetherin-30-minute pies, these pastries were culinary masterpieces, food of the gods, extraterrestrial delights.

Pies oozing with cherries, cinnamon apples and thick butterscotch cream chanted in unison:

Tart lemon chiffon, thick apple custard topped with grated cheese, and blueberry slices of Imiss-my-mom. All fresh, at least 12 different flavors, and they were selling faster than the kitchen hands could slice them.

"We've all been going like this since 9:30," Laura McNeil, the pie boss, said about noon Saturday.

Working feverishly alongside her were five other volunteers and master bakers: Betty Weir, Jean Crow, Edith Arnold, Laura Barfoot and Sheila McNeil.

Earlier in the morning Audrey Hepburn, Bea Nixon and Marjory Atkinson put in their time on rotating two-hour shifts. "But somebody's late I don't dock

'em," McNeil joked.

Hot beef and ham and cheese on a bun were also on the menu along with homemade chocolate squares, popular with the young-

Each year, since the fair started 127 years ago, members of the agricultural society have been baking pies for the annual event, said McNeil.

This year the pie boss asked each member of the womens division to supply two pies each.

A total of 40 pies were stockpiled in boxes beneath the counter Saturday. But not for long. "I've got about 10 back behind me," McNeil said about noon. "When they run out, they run
