This pamphlet quotes our objective as follows: "We desire that each county may have its own historical records printed dating from the time of its first settlement down to the present, when the careful recording of current events of importance should take care of that, which, in the future will be history.

In 1947, Miss Anna P. Lewis, Director of the Women's Institute Branch and Home Economics Service, spoke at a Sudbury Institute. Miss Lewis quoted a message from The Lady Tweedsmuir as follows: "We have a great future before us, we have a steady influence because our roots are in the past, our minds and hands are working in the present, and our eyes are looking clearly into the future".

On Oct. 26, 1949, Lady Tweedsmuir sent a letter to Mrs. C.G. Strong, F.W.I.C. Sec-Treas. stating (I quote) I am so pleased that you are using the Foreword for the Tweedsmuir Histories of Canada, and I am so absolutely rejoiced to hear that the work is going forward so splendidly. I have recast the first sentence of the Foreword, but please alter it if you prefer it the old way".

The general appearance of the Tweedsmuir History Book might be improved by neatness in arranging pictures, photos and clippings. Do not crowd material on the pages. The legibility and readability will be better if carefully written or type written in large letters and the words spaced well. A good quality of paper should be used. Bond paper has been suggested. Thin paper inserted between the pages might be held in place with reinforcements. Pictures should be named and dated whenever possible, and the names of the people in the picture should be recorded. We know who the people are in these pictures to-day but the future generations will not know who they are unless we print the names. So let us think of recording for the people who live after us. Be sure to have the name of the newspaper and dates and source of information given so that in the future, the people will know when these events took place. The size of the History book is left to the decision of the branch Institute.

All excellent addresses and papers on pioneers, and present settlers, and current events should be carefully preserved in every branch and passed on from one convener to the
