room table is still in the Home and a
copy of the original Constitution has
been preserved." The three Council
representatives officially cut the ribbon, then all present were able to browse through the Home.

Mrs. Thos. McCreadie, President of Wentworth South District, welcomed the group, and members from nearby the Home served lunch and acted as hostesses.

Mr. Gordon Bennett, on behalf of the Ontario Ministry of Agriculture and Food, brought greetings and expressed his thanks for being invited back to his native County, and wished us well not only at the Home but in all our Women's Institute projects.

Committee members, Miss Helen McKercher and Mrs. Wm. G. Miller were introduced and the President, Mrs. H. L. Noblitt, spoke of the strength in leadership given by the Lees since arriving in 1792.
