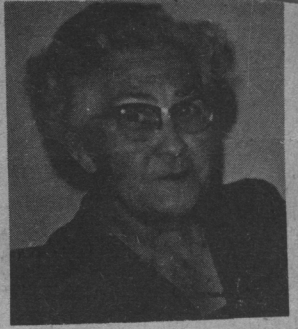

The death of Miss Pearl Krick on April 16, 1970 on her 72nd birthday is deeply regretted in Stoney Creek where she had been active in community affairs. She was the daughter of David and Harriet Krick whose farm was on Ridge Road in Saltfleet. With her sister, Lazelle, she was instrumental in founding the Saltfleet Junior Institute in 1926. This became the Saltfleet Women's Institute which for 44 years now has contributed in all ways to the good of the area upholding its motto "For Home and Country".

Miss Krick was president in 1938, 1939 and 1940 and was secretary-treasurer from 1952 to 1964. In 1958 the Saltfleet Women's Institute bestowed a life membership on Miss Krick in recognition of the tremendous work she had done through the Second World War years and beyond in organizing the group in sewing and quilting projects. Over 1,000 quilts were pieced and quilted to be given to the Red Cross and the Wentworth Children's Aid Society. She and her group of quilters were honoured by the Red Cross Society.

Miss Krick will be remembered for her years as manager of the cafeteria at Saltfleet High School by the students who enjoyed her pies and butter tarts. She belonged to the Stoney Creek Horticultural Society and in recent years has been active in the Golden Years Club in Stoney Creek.

She is survived by one brother, Roy of Stoney Creek and by nieces and other relatives of the area and by many close friends. She was a vital person who added to the lives of all who knew her.
