woman has taken her proper place and exerted her great influence not only in the home, where she must ever remain the most important factor, but in everything in which the interests of women and children are concerned. It is my candid opinion that community life owes more to the work of the Women's Institute than to any other agency. In fact, I have a notion that the work of the Institute is to do whatever needs doing and is not being done. Now I have tried to show some of the many accomplishments in the growth of the Women's Institute. There is much more to be done and I trust that unitedly we will do it.

The Institute has had four superintendents, Mr. F. W. Hodson, Dr. Creelman, Mr. Putman and Miss McDermand. Numerically, I believe there are around 1370 branches in Ontario with about 42,000 members.

Oh, there's something about the Institute That makes life seem worth while; There's something bout the meetings Puts more sunshine in our smile; With their helpful demonstrations And the friendly roll calls too, Make the meetings bright and helpful And full of interest through.

There's fellowship in the meetings That outsiders don't possess; There's restfulness and comfort Making for true happiness; There's the theme of education, There's music in the air, There are kindly hearts and faces Abl around us everywhere.

And there's this bout our meetings, Our loyal, noble creed Seems to lift us from Life's problems And wetshare our sister's need. At our meetings, we can talk of all The things of truest worth. Oh, we feel the Women's Institute Is the best organization on earth.
