

It was also suggested that we ask Mrs A. E. Walker to preside over our election of officers. We were privileged to have as our guests Mr and Mrs A. H. Magill, the latter being field secretary of the National Institute for the Blind, who gave us such a vivid insight into the work among these handicapped people, who number 10,600 in Canada alone. It is possible to overcome the handicap of blindness for the C.N.O.B have formed programs flexible to fit for all blind folks to fit into. 52 men are employed in the broom factory in Toronto; 39 blind girls in white ware Dept. Private businesses are carried on, such as laundries. Some are managers of Cafeterias. Mr Magill particularly mentioned one girl Mary Robertson working in a factory sorting screens thus being able to earn her own living. Home teaching is also provided for the more helpless cases. He closed his address by stressing the prevention of blindness. Mr Magill himself has been blind 12 yrs and this made us appreciate his talker even greater. A special collection was taken for this most worthy cause amounting to \$8.25. We also held a sale of home made
