

In Vancouver, an increase from 10 to 11 cents a quart for 3.5 per cent. milk, authorized some time ago, will go into effect September 1. For Halifax and Montreal, an increase September 1 of one-half cent per quart was announced by the board as necessary to completion of the reorganization of ceiling prices on fluid milk undertaken last spring. The present price in these cities is 12 cents a quart. Concurrently, the board fixed
