At the banquet table when the trophy was presented, he recalled the former championship and told of the Burlington team of that time bringing in "ringers" from across the border in an unsuccessful effort to beat the Winona club.

A retired fruit grower, he is president of Winona Growers and is also president of Winona Institute Hall, Limited. He was born in Bartonville, a son of the late Ransom Smith, and spent his lifetime on the farm of his United Empire Loyalist great-grandparents at Winona.
