Of exceptional interest is the ceremony taking place in St. Clement's Anglican Church, Toronto, at 3 o'clock this afternoon, when two prominent old Ontario families will be united by the marriage of Elizabeth Ann, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Clifford Sifton, and granddaughter of the late Sir Clifford Sifton, Toronto, and Major Ernest Llewellyn Gibson Smith, son of Brigadier and Mrs. Armand Smith, of Winona, and grandson of the Honourable E. D. Smith, Winona, and the late Honourable William Gibson, of Beamsville. Several hun-

dred guests will be in attendance, including a large number from various places in Canada. Rev. W. G. Nicholson is to read the service.

White stocks and gypsophila arranged throughout the church will form a delightful setting for the lovely bride and her five attendants, who will be wearing summery white frocks.

The bride, given away by her father, will be gowned in white satin trimmed with lace at the neckline. Her tulle veil, enriched with panels of rare old rosepoint lace (which had been worn by her mother on her wedding day) will be draped from a tiara lace head-dress, and she will carry a bouquet of white orchids and lilies-of-the-valley.

Wearing dainty gowns of white flowered organdy, and large white hats to match, the bride's retinue of lovely girls will be composed of: Miss June Sifton, maid of honour; Mrs. Casalear Middleton, Mrs. William Richardson, Mrs. Lawrence Hynes and Mrs. Donald Paterson. All will carry white and yellow daisies and cornflowers.

Lieut. A. A. G. Smith, Winona, will be best man, and the ushers are to be Flight-Lieut. John Paterson, Fort William, Ont.; Capt. Jim Flintoft, Westmount, Que.; Major Joseph Pigott, Hamilton, and Mr. Colin Eastwood, Hamilton.

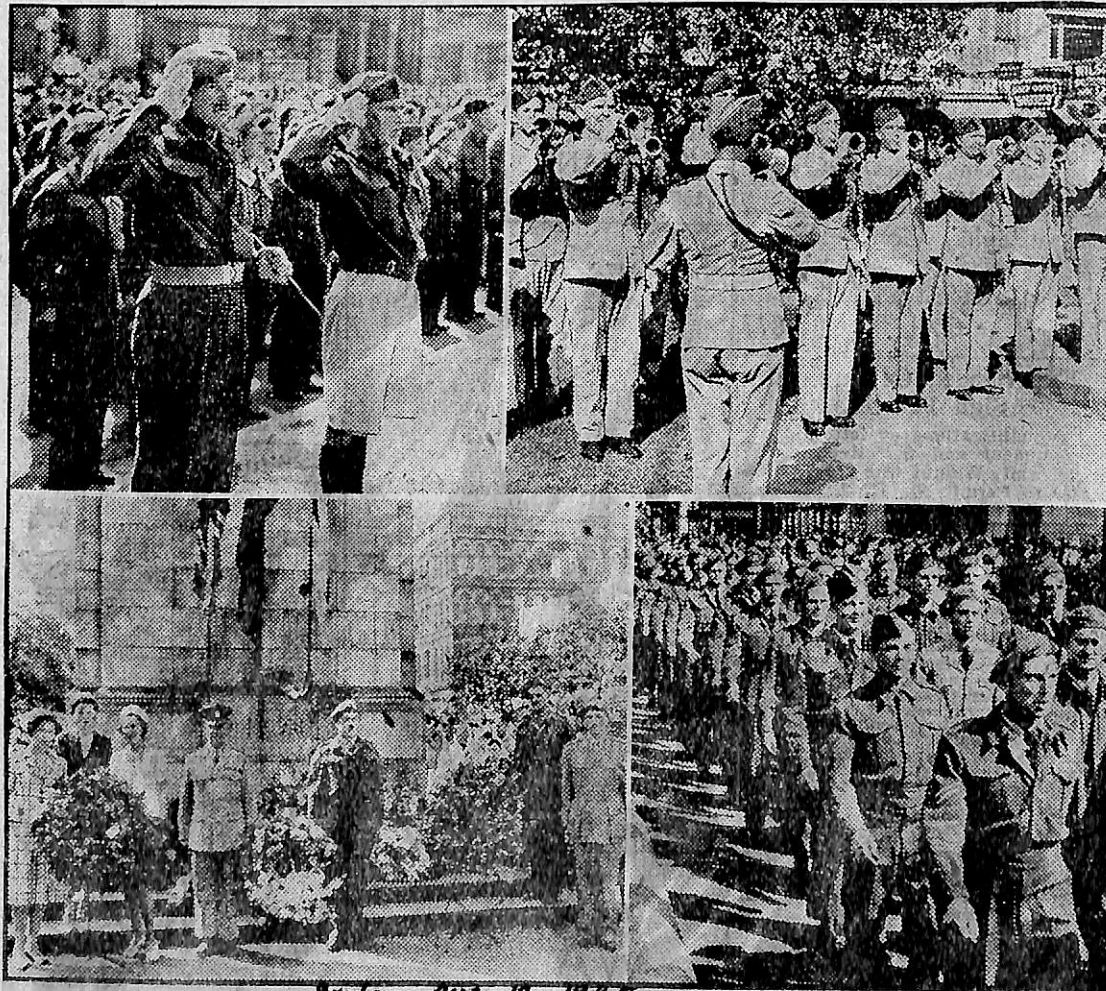
Spring flowers in profusion adorn the home of the bride's parents, white stocks and yellow roses predominating, with white sweet peas on the bride's table. The bride will cut the cake with the bridegroom's sword.

Mrs. Sifton, mother of the bride, will be in yellow crepe, her brown mohair hat being trimmed with pink ribbon. Her flowers will be pink roses. Mrs. Armand Smith, mother of the groom, who will assist her in receiving at the reception, will wear aquamarine crepe, motifs of daisies embroidering the bodice and skirt. Her small straw hat, veiled in green, is trimmed with daisies and satin bows. She will be wearing yellow orchids.

Going away on the honeymoon, the bride will wear a grey dress, and hat trimmed with grey and green feathers, and a silver blue fox jacket. The young couple will live in Winona.

MEMORIAL SERVICE — Scenes taken yesterday during the parade and service held in remembrance of officers and men of the Royal Hamilton Light Infantry (active) 1st Battalion (W.R.), who gave their lives in the Dieppe raid three years ago, are shown in the accompanying photographs. In the upper left picture, Lieut.-Col. R. R. Labatt, commanding officer of the battalion during the raid, is shown on the left, and Lieut.-Col. A. E. Parker, M.C. and bar, commanding officer of the 2nd Battalion, on the right, saluting the cenotaph. Upper

right shows the bugle section of the band playing Last Post. Lower left, wreaths are placed on the cenotaph. Shown in the picture are Mrs. G. S. Matchett, Mrs. Donald McIlwain and Mrs. Reginald Baisley, wives of three officers who lost their lives during the raid, on the left; R.S.M. William Browett, M.M., and Lieut. K. R. Henderson, centre, and Pte. H. M. McCormack, who was taken a prisoner of war, and Lieut. G. D. Harvey, on the right. Lower right shows members of the regiment who took part in the raid on Dieppe approaching the cenotaph.
