

During the war years this Community was not found sleeping. Fingers were busy knitting, sewing and making jam for Red Cross. No definite accounts can be found of the efforts of World War I except a few pictures of those who offered their services on the field of battle.

It has been recorded that during World War II the sum of \$1975.93 was raised for war work. The present Secretary-treasurer of the Women's Institute can only give the account of how \$1701.61 was spent, but all money raised was used directly for war work.
