



Rednersville Church in 1968 Picture donated by Mrs. Winston Pulver, 1968.

Rednersville United Church Marks Centenary On Sunday



Above is shown an exterior view of Rednersville United Church which marked its Centenary on Sunday. Plaque inset above the doorway of the church, tells the date of construction.

Historical data relating to the church has been collected by Mr. Mueller, whose ancestors lived in the Redner and collect. Rednersville United Church is celebrating its centenary on Sunday, Octoper 16th, when the guest preacher will be Rev. J. I. MacKay, D.D., superintendent of Home Missions of Bay of Quinte, Montreal and Ottawa conferences. There will be two services, namely at 11 a.m. and 7.30 p.m.

This church was built in 1849, and dedicated on February 17th, 1850. Minutes concerning church affairs are complete from the beginning, as is revealed in historical notes gleaned by Theo. G. Mueller, in co-operation with Rev. J. P. Henderson, M.A., minister Rednersville Circuit.

These minutes reveal that a meeting was held on September 23rd, 1848. at which time it was "resolved" to open a subscription for the purpose of building a Wesleyan Methodist Church at Rednersville. The subscription list having progressed to a suitable extent, a building committee was appointed Comprising Owen Roblin, James Redner, Marshall B. Roblin, Phillp Roblin and Robert N. Sheriff. The original trustees were Isaac Williams, Marshall B. Roblin, John H. Morden, Philip Roblin, William Brickman, Robt. N. Sheriff, James Redner and William A. Johnston.

On Jan. 5th, 1849, a contract was let to George Savage to build for four hundred pounds a building 36 feet x 48 feet, "to have a steeple and a gallery on three sides, two windows in each side and two in the front of Gothic form." Centenary Program

A special centenary program, to be available at next Sunday's privice gives details of progress in establishing the church, and a scibute is paid to the people who contributed to the effort. Historical Comment

When the present church was built, Rednersville was an appointment on the Consecon Circuit of the Wesleyan Methodist Church. Rev. R. John was minister and Marshall B. Roblin, Secty-treasurer of the Board of Trustees and Building Committee at the time of building.

The first Board of Trustees were: - Isaac Williams, Marshall B. Roblin, John H. Morden, Philip Roblin, Wm. Brickman, Robert N. Sherriff, James Redner, Wm. A. Johnston.

The contract for the building was let to Mr. Geo, Savage for somewhat over £400, currency being still in pounds, shillings and pence. With the exception of a very small amount, the church was opened free of debt.

Later in 1879, the Rednersville circuit was formed with Rednersville, Albury (then Dempsey's) and Massassaga as appointments. Very som after, Massassaga was transferred to the Ameliasburg circuit and Centre became an appointment with Rednersville. In 1915, Victoria was added from the Consecon circuit, so that at present Rednersville is a 4-point charge.

It is fitting that we pause to pay tribute to those pioneers who made bhis edifice possible. The road was rought and long These early settlers incountered the difficulties of clearing the primeval forest, of surviving frost and drought, of carving out trails and roads, of carrying grain on their backs long distances, to secure their food. In order to near their families, they had to nurse them sometimes through sekness and epidenoits without the care of destors and nurses. Yet in apite of these almost insuperable difficulties, they took time to come together over long distances to worship God, and devised ways and means with conternaingenuity and devotion even when money was scarce, by which this present church was built. Over 150 heads of families and over 200 individuals over a wide area, sacrificed time, money and produce in making their contents.
