



HOME OF RALPH AND MARGARET RICHARDS

This dwelling is located on lot 46, concession 2, west of Green Point; the road was named Black Street, because two families surnamed "Black" lived here in the early days.

Dan Goodwin sold the property to a DeMille, from whom Willet Richards purchased it.

Willet Richards' son Blake and his bride, Florence (Potter) lived in this home until 1932, at which time they moved to the main farmhouse lot 47,- following the death of Willet,-his wife Margaret(Sprung) having predeceased him in 1919.

From 1932 until 1943, tenants occupied the house, or it remained

unoccupied several years.

In December, 1943, Ralph and Margaret were married and began a programme of renovation and addition which has included replacement of all interior walls and ceilings, new floors, addition of a sunporch, an east addition which includes a large kitchen, bedroom, hall and bathroom, with a large bedroom upstairs and a half bath.
