

# Truck Driver Charged

## After Accident On 401

Donald Trumpour died early Sunday morning in Belleville hospital from injuries suffered when he was struck by a truck on Highway 401, northeast of Marysville on Friday.

Mr. Trumpour was hauling gravel from a pit near the recently opened two-lane stretch of 401 north of Marysville to the nearby Highway 2 expansion project. Police say he had stopped his vehicle for some reason still unknown, and was standing by the roadside when the accident happened.

A westbound vehicle brushed against the gravel truck and Mr. Trumpour was crushed against its sides. He was found unconscious beside his truck.

Later, provincial police checking vehicles at the 401 rest centre northeast of Trenton took Leonard Gorman Gvesl, 33, of Calgary, into custody. He was returning to Toronto driving a tractor-trailer after delivering cattle in Ottawa. He has been charged with leaving the scene of an accident.

Donald Trumpour was 38 years of age and was born in Hillier. Until last August, when he moved to Belleville, residing at 24 Gilbert St., he lived in Picton.

Before going into the trucking business, he was a car salesman with Roblin Motor Sales and prior to that operated Quinte food delivery service.

Keenly interested in sports, he was both an active participant in football both as a player and as a manager of teams. He also played in county hockey leagues.

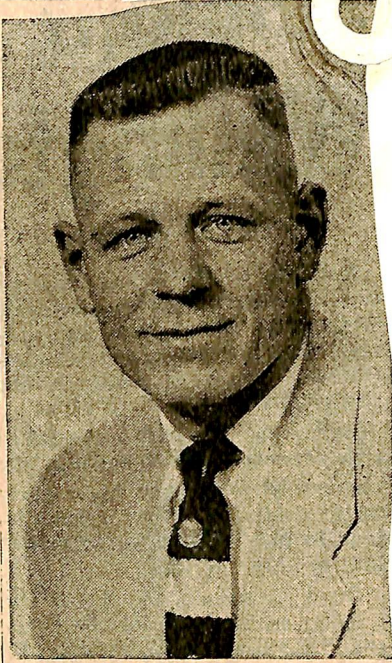
Don was a member of Picton Kinsmer Club and an adherent of the United Church. His always friendly and smiling personality won him many friends who were shocked to learn of his death.
