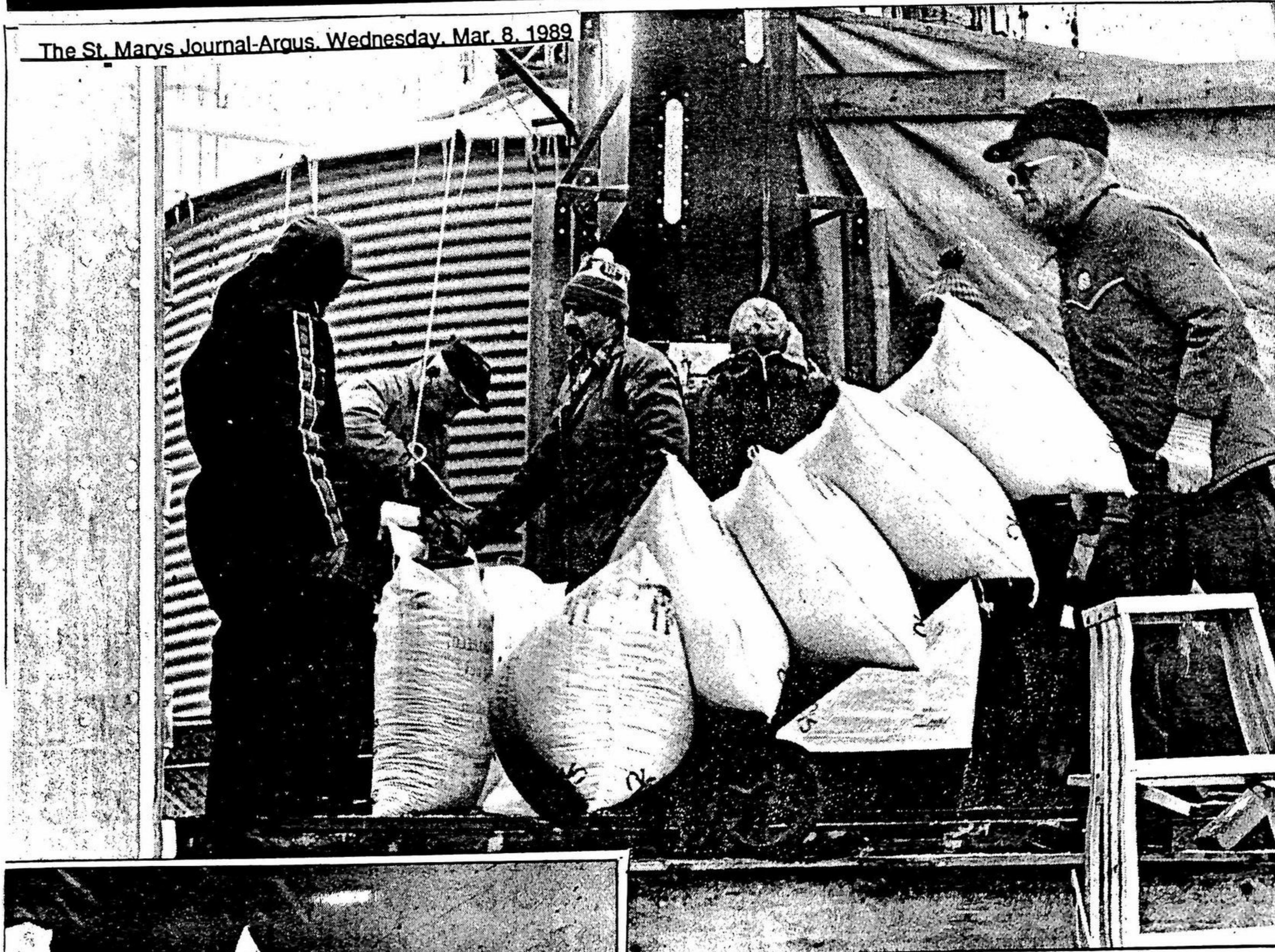


# Harrington area farmers give of themselves

the Embro area to Mozambique. Multiply that \$7.50 a few times over and you alone can feed thousands of needy people who might not otherwise know where their next meal is coming from.

This is a "direct aid" program — there are no intermediary agencies involved. Almost 100 per cent of the work is voluntary.

Christian churches in Africa help to monitor where the greatest need is. The movement of the shipment and distribution of the grain is monitored by church members.

Unlike last year's "Corn for Mali" project, when volunteers loaded bags onto truck trailers bound for Hamilton harbour, the corn this year will be transported to Montreal for

shipping.

Adding the Corn Drive to their other projects, the Canadian Foodgrains Bank expects to ship more than \$20 million worth of food aid in the fiscal year ending March 31, 1989.
