Atchison-Ouellette Union Double Ring Ceremony

MILLBROOK (ENS) — Jane Marie Ouellette and William Allan Atchison were married in a double ring ceremony performed by the Rev. Stanley E. Snowden in St. Andrew's United church Saturday. She is the younger daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Homer Ouellette of Millbrook, and he is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Reginald Atchison of South Monaghan.

Chancel of the church was banked with baskets of white chrysanthemums and pink carnations.

Traditional wedding music was played by organist Ashton McMaster. Before the bride entered the church Mrs. Lawrence Winslow, aunt of the groom, sang "The Lord's Prayer". During signing of the register she sang "O Perfect Love".

Her father gave her in marriage and Miss Ouellette wore a gown of imported organza and silk, featuring a bouffant skirt with bustle back extending into a chapel train. The bodice had a portrait neckline and long pointed sleeves. Details of French embroidery appeared on both bodice and skirt in lily-of-the-valley motif. Her bouffant veil of imported French veiling was appliqued with roses of organza especially designed to follow the lines of the dress. She carried a cascade of red roses and trailing ivy.

Attending the bride were her sister, Mrs. John Draper of Peterborough, as matron-of-honor, Miss Patricia Moncrief of South Monaghan, and Miss Bertheena Junkin of Bobcaygeon, bridesmaids. Miss Lorie Atchison, sister of the groom was flower girl.

The attendants wore identical gowns of seafoam green with imported lace bodices, finished with rounded necklines and tiny sleeves, and fully bouffant skirts of peau de soie, complemented with rolled tie sashes at the waist. They chose mohair lopped crowns in matching color, each centred with a cabbage rose and enhanced with an over-

the-face veil. All had white wrist length gloves and their shoes, except those of the flower girl who wore white, were tinted to match their gowns.

The flower girl's bouquet was a miniature of the bride's. The other attendants carried semi-cascades of white poms and pink sweet-heart roses.

Groomsman was Robert Packman of South Monaghan, and the ushers were Paul Ouellette, brother of the bride, and Malcolm Syer of South Monaghan, brother-in-law of the groom.

The groom's mother was wearing a navy shantung jacket dress with dinner neckline and bodice of sheer organza. Her hat and accessories were in navy and white and she wore a corsage of pink roses.

For the wedding trip to points in the States, the bride donned a three-piece dress in cream boucle trimmed in brown. Her hat had a Swiss braid crown and featured a wider brim of matching chiffon. Her top coat was in cream fleecy wool with brown trim, and she wore matching accessories and a corsage of Johanna Hill roses.
