- 1939 The Second World War began and the W.I. formed a War Work Committee. To a great extent this Committee worked with the local Red Cross in all it's phases including; knitting, sewing, quilting, packing boxes for local men in the forces, helping with the Annual Street Fair, and with ath Salvage Campaigns. Independently catering to panqueus, holding euchres, skating parties and teas made money for supplies. Many Ditty Bags were outfitted and each w.I. member helped where she could.
