1935 - 20th. Anniversary celebrated. (See following page)

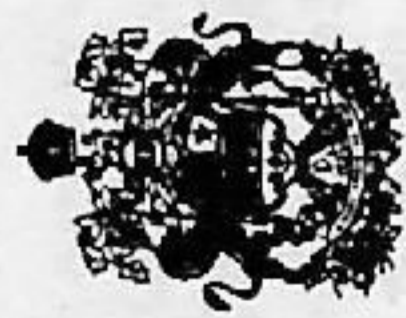
1936 - The W.I. served meals on a hot July day when the Orangemen celebrated in Blackstock and the village teemed with visitors.

1937 - The Group System for Lunches and programs was changed to six groups ;
1. Canadianization and Immigration
2. Education and Legislation
3. Health and Child Welfare
4. Community Activities and Relief
5. Historical Research and Home Economics
6. Peace and Agriculture

1939 - The Second World War began and the W.I. formed a War Work Committee. To a great extent this Committee worked with the local Red Cross in all it's phases including; knitting, sewing, quilting, packing boxes for local men in the forces, helping with the Annual Street Fair, and with ^{the} Salvage Campaigns. Independently, catering to banquets, holding euchres, skating parties and teas made money for supplies. Many Ditty Bags were outfitted and each W.I. member helped where she could.

In 1939 the first Home and Country Magazine was on display and 4 copies were ordered.
