Accident claims Blackstock girl

Funeral services were held Súnday afternoon at the Blackstock United Church for 19 year old Eleanor Marie Kelly, who died early Thursday evening in a car accident on Regional Road 57, south of Caesarea.

Her 20 year old sister Elizabeth, a passenger in the car, remains in Oshawa Hospital where she is being treated for arm injuries.

Durham Police say the single car accident occurred about 7:30 p.m. in a heavy rainstorm that made road conditions slippery at the time. The girls were returning to their home in Blackstock after collecting census forms in the Caesarea area.

According to police, the car was travelling slowly about 100 metres north of Concession Six, when it went out of control and flipped over. several hundred metres of the scene Blackstock United Church.

Eleanor was a popular and wellliked teenager, who was involved in numerous community activities in the Blackstock area. A graduate of Cartwright High School, she had completed her second year of nursing studies at Queens University in Kingston.








Community mourns a tragic death

Blackstock United Church was filled beyond capacity Sunday afternoon when more than 400 family members and friends came to mourn the sudden death of Donald Douglas Wright, 33, who died in Thursday afternoon's natural gas line explosion north of Oshawa.

Mr. Wright was part of a fourman work crew from Walker and Wright Drainage that was laying drainage pipe on farmland north of the Sixth Concession west of Simcoe TransCanada Street when PipeLine's main natural gas line was punctured about 2:13 p.m.

The son of Lloyd and Thelma

Wright of Blackstock, Don Wright was well known in the Cartwright area, and was living in Bethany with his wife Dianne and children Andrea and Travis.

Graham Duff, 33, of R.R.2, Blackstock, was badly burned in the explosion but was reported in fair condition in the Burn Centre of Wellesley Hospital. Originally he was taken by ambulance to Oshawa General Hospital before being transferred to Wellesley, where by Monday he was improving slightly and starting to eat and drink on his own.

Kevin Brazier, 24, of Lindsay, was

listed in stable condition at Oshawa General Hospital Monday morning.

Joseph Peeters, 22, of Omemee, a drainage installer, was treated in Oshawa and released, and Paul Burkholder, 59, of Markham, a TransCanada PipeLines inspector, was treated in Oshawa and released.

Mr. Burkholder was supervising the work of the drainage crew near the pipe when the explosion occured, a TransCanada standard procedure when any work is being done around a pipeline.

The four-man drainage crew had made the trip to Guymaples Farm to replace drainage tiles, a job which should have taken a day to complete.

No one is sure how the accident happened but machinery the crew was using ripped into the 20 inch diameter steel pipe, buried three to five feet in the ground where the break occured. A second pipe, about 20 feet from the main line, was not damaged.

A five-man coroner's jury led by Dr. Charles McIlveen of Oshawa was on the scene Friday morning from 9 a.m. to noon, collecting
