Sometimes persons who have little knowledge of the subject make strong and sweeping statements about what the school should do, but experienced educators and thoughtful parents are usually more cautious. They realize that it is difficult to apply any one theory or one practice under all circumstances and to all young people. They are willing to study the views of others with an open mind. For example uninformed persons may say: "Freedom is folly — children should be disciplined — discipline depraves—children should be free."

Both are at the same time right and wrong. A thoughtful person will search for the formula that will reduce the error and enlarge the truth of both statements.
