## Brief Sketch of Events 1922 - 1950

Prior to this date, pupils, graduating from Public School in this area, had to leave school or continue futher education elsewhere. The two nearest secondary schools were at Port Perry, 6 miles distant, or at Bowmanville, 12 miles distant.

In Sept. 1922, by the permission of the Department of Education, two forms were accommodated in the town hall.

- Each school section dealt with the idea of building a Continuation school and the vote was against it. However, in spite of this opposition, a poll was held on a by-law to permit the building of the school. This by-law was passed, but, the newly elected school board of 3 members had a majority opposing the school. Their election was protested on the grounds that some of the voters lacked proper credentials to vote. A A new election was held and this board voted for the new school. The Council also blocked the movement at first but finally consented to issue a debenture.
- The corner stone was laid for the new Continuation School Building.

  The site chosen was about the centre of Blackstock village on the west side of Scugog Road. George McLaughlin, a native son of Blackstock, was the contractor and the school consisted of two large classrooms, a teacher's room and a basement. The school opened in Sept. 1925 with two teachers to instruct the pupils as far as Junior Matriculation. The school's status was a Grade B Continuation School.
- 1938 With George Crawford, another native son, as contractor, two class rooms, a Home Economics room, a Shop room and an office and Library combined were added. The Basement was also remodelled for a 5th. form, a class of Senior Matriculation pupils. The status of the school was now a Grade A Continuation School with 3 teachers.

The school was heated with a stoker steam heating plant.

- 1949 A telephone was put in the school.
- 1950 The Department of Education and the County Council approved the changing of the school from a Continuation to a High School and 4 teachers
