"I sent in my \$25 to join the association and gave a few details of what I have done. The team leader found me. I had mentioned I had worked on (airplane) undercarriages in at Dowty the first 12 years of my working career."

What the Halifax team leader told Terry might have daunted others: "He said, "Well, we haven't got one'."

These days, Terry tries to put in one day a week at the Halifax project in Trenton. Poring over old blueprints, studying the plane and its components, Terry determined if push came to show, the team could make their own replacement parts - no mean feat.

Then, as Karl Kjangaard continued to track down Halifax information, parts and lore from around the world. news came a downed Halifax bomber lay in a bog in Belgium.

The problem, says Karl, is that the plane is in "teeny weenie" pieces after the impact of the crash - except for the landing gear. Somehow, reports have come, the landing gear is in good shape.

For Terry, the challenge may now be somewhat less daunting.

Making something from something is, after all, sometimes easier than making something from nothing.

On the opposite side of a workbench to Terry is John Dawson, a man who grew up in the same English County as Terry.

Other former industry contacts from years ago are. Thinking back to his school years and the years of his aviation apprenticeship, Terry remembers "seeing hundreds and hundreds of aircraft being broken up. I don't doubt a Halifax was among them."

The man who worked on the Avro Arrow, a plane sent to scrap after its cancellation, has not missed the irony of putting together a Halifax bomber once thought to be non-existent.

"It has been most interesting," Terry says. Indeed.

The book has an index of names for easy reference.

The committee preparing for the 200th anniversary of township settlement first began its research several years ago. Former and present residents were invited to participate by sending old photographs and material for the book. When there was a very generous response, the book took on a two-pronged approach: a committee researched history and a community-donated history.

The family stories and reminiscences give a vivid picture of township life over the past 200 years, from pioneer times of the early 1800s to post-War refugees of the 1950s.

The title of the book reflects the varied recollections and, in particular, the narrative of Susan B. Greeley, daughter of Aaron Greeley who surveyed the township in 1796. A quotation from her reminiscence appears as the frontispiece.
