

## The Troubadour of Percy

In the Middle Ages in beautiful southern France, Italy and Spain, itinerant poets and singers, known as troubadours, traveled the roads by foot. They were akin to the wandering minstrels of England and the pied pipers of Germany.

In the 1920s and 30s, a colourful figure, dressed always in a heavy dark cloth coat, could be seen wandering the winding roads and lanes of Percy Township, singing as he went. His name was Bill Weber.

Bill lived by himself in an old house west of Warkworth, near Skinkle's Pond. At the time, a road went up the south side of the pond by the old Warkworth Lumber Company and led directly to his home. As he grew older, he went to live with his sister in Meyersburg, near Percy Boom. It is thought that he lived to be about ninety years of age.

He could be seen winter and summer, spring and fall, walking over the hills and dales of Percy Township. When he was hungry, he would stop for a meal at any house he might be near. He was often early enough for breakfast and, it was reported, had occasion to help himself to the money left out in the bottles for the milkman.

Bill attended all the funerals and auction sales, although he was never known to buy anything. On Sunday, he would appear in churches and sing along lustily, almost bellowing, having memorized all of the words.

Weekdays, Bill could often be found sitting around the hot stove at the back of Boyce's Hardware Store in Warkworth, where the laundromat can now be found. He would swap stories with whoever would come in to get warm or make a purchase.

On one occasion, Bill was taken to court, having been accused of stealing an overcoat. When asked by the judge to state his occupation, Bill pleaded for clemency claiming, "I am an evangelist! I hold 'tractive meetings (protractive talks) with the Indians at Alderville."

So if you are traveling in the woods of Percy, especially near Skinkle's Pond, or if you are in church or at a sale, you might just hear a distant voice coming from what may look like a grey, wispy cloud. It could be the ghost of Bill Weber, the Troubadour of Percy!
