While the oil painting is entitled "The Jazz Pianist", artist Ruth Coleman Harding told us the subject is also her son.



Elizabeth Allen (nee Duncan) was born on the family farm in Morganston, Ontario, January 11, 1914. She resided there, attending Pine Woods public school and Morganston United Church until she passed the "entrance" exams at age twelve, whereupon she and her mother and sister moved to the village of Warkworth for her to, attend high school. Upon joining St. Paul's United church, she became very actively involved with Sunday School, singing in the church choir, and participating in the then very active Young People's Society. While acting in the YPS annual drama presentation she met her husband to be, W. Grant Allen. They were married January 23, 1932, and resided in Warkworth throughout their marriage of over sixty-six years. Ill health compelled them to move to the Community Nursing Home just over two years ago, and it was there that she passed away suddenly on Saturday, July 11, 1998.

Always with imagination, great skill, and energy, Elizabeth contributed untiringly to the life of her church and. her community. She spearheaded the organizing of community bands, historical societies, oil painting classes, and the resurrection of community parades, to name only a few.
