Why Wicklow Baptist is county's oldest church

Editor:

Thank you for the publicity regarding the article "Wicklow Church deserves to be preserved".

There is one point I would appreciate being corrected, otherwise it puts the dates wrong.

Reuben Crandall established Haldimand Baptist Church in 1798 just west of Lakeport. Because the building, that was also used for a school, was damaged, the ministry relocated to Wicklow in 1824.

It is the 1798 date that made it the oldest church in Northumberland County. We celebrated 200 years last year - 1998.

Church, was in fact built in 1822. This would indicate there was a group of Anglican worshippers in the community well before that, of sufficient number they could actually build the building that still stands as "the sentinel on the hill" on King Street in Port Hope. So old St. John's Church, now St. Mark's, as a building, was actually older than Wicklow Baptist Church, not by much, but older. Certainly not 25 years younger.

The facts, as they pertain to others, did get a little garbled. Certainly Wicklow Baptist Church, established in 1824, was one of the oldest churches in Northumberland, if not in Southern Ontario. But the article goes on to say that "... Port Hope came second 25 years later with the Anglican church."

St. Mark's Anglican Church in Port Hope, originally known as St John's
