The 1999 annual Association of Municipalities of Ontario will be held August 22-25 in Toronto. This year's annual municipal pow-wow, marking the 125th anniversary of the association, is changing conference location from the Royal York Hotel to the Weston Harbour Castle Hotel on Queen's Quay in Toronto.

Accounts payable totalling

\$453,563.19 were approved by Cramahe Township council March 15 - with some easing words from Clerk Administrator Gerry Morrison.

"That includes our first payments due for 1999 for education, Northumberland County and policing," he reassured council members.

The county will receive

\$210,000 as its March 30 installment of the tax dollars, the Ontario Provincial Police \$71,000, and \$8,700 (50 per cent of 1999 levy) to the Lower Trent Region Conservation Authority.

In addition, the township's final payment as its share of the new Colborne-Cramahe Fire Department pumper truck was approved for \$89,000.

Clerk Administrator
Gerry Morrison replied.

"However, a year from now, that is something the transition board (comprised of all council members of both municipalities) can look at it. We will be meeting together in 2000," he suggested.

For 1999, the township approved paying \$35,039.64, including PST and GST, as it's premium for coverage.

The firm Jardine Insurance is also moving the policy term to run January through December to align with the municipal fiscal year. Previously, the insurance coverage was for April through April. Even with only nine months to pay for in 1999, the township's 1999 insurance cost is an estimated \$900 less than 12 months of 19998 coverage.

Colborne Village is covered by the same insurance company. Jardine Insurance has formulated an insurance package with Ontario municipalities as members.
