

The four top needs of the Township of Cramahe are more industry for jobs, better services, attracting more people and preserving the quality of life says Reeve Jim Williams. In his inaugural address January 2, Mr. Williams framed the course for the new five-person municipal council.

"We need more industry for jobs. That means to me expansion of the sewage treatment plant, attracting new industry," Mr. Williams told the gathering of 60-plus people at the Colborne Municipal Building ceremony.

"We need to preserve our quality of life. That means to me protection of the environment - the air we breathe, the water we drink.

"We need better services. That means to me better police services and the maintenance of the quality of our fire and ambulance services, high quality maintenance of our roads and streets."

And finally, "We need to attract more people to our community. To me, that means planned residential development, emphasis on tourism and economic development."

Before the end of January, an office for the Reeve and council members will open in the town hall. The space will be available for individuals to meet council members.

"I hope to be available in the office on a regular basis on Thursday of each week," Mr. Williams explained. "The office will also be available to all members of council who wish to research any item before council, review current issues at county council or to meet with any constituents.

"I expect council decisions to be made after thorough discussion, community input and staff preparation. Whether or not everyone agrees, I expect council to speak with one voice - the decision of council," Mr. Williams said. "Similarly, after a council decision, if it is an informed decision based on community input, I ask for your support of the decision."

To fulfill the needs identified by the electorate, the Township of Cramahe council needs dedicated, hardworking staff - "We have it", planning and organization. The new council will meet the first and third Mondays on the month and as a general committee on the second and fourth Tuesday of the month.

"These committee meetings will be open to the public, will receive delegations and receive departmental reports on general government, protection to persons and property, public work, environment, parks and recreation and planning and development."

All committees of council will report to the general committee.

"It is hoped that this new structure will allow members of council to keep informed on all issues before council, and will allow a wider range of discussion of issues," Mr. Williams said.

"Decisions will not be made at this level but will be received as recommendations by council at the regular council meetings."
