## Colborne student earns Millennium Scholarship

volunteer activities. Six hundred Local Laureates named were across Canada.

The 19-year-old graduate attained a 90-per-cent average in her top six subjects and is headed to Queen's University in the fall where she will study Life Sciences. Following completion of an honours degree she expects to go to take a masters degree and one day medicine.

Accepting her accomplishments is not an easy task for the amiable student. She was quick to acknowledge that others at school have won bigger awards and

made significant accomplishments to the school.

Kristina attributes her success in dealing with people to the strong bonds she has made in Colborne. In the village she has connected with seniors and children as well as her peers. The skills she has picked up in these experiences have made it easier to meet new people and adjust to difficult situations. She says "Colborne is a small community with a large heart".

Her failures growing up have made her strive for something greater and her successes have given her the courage to elaborate on new ideas.

The laureate has spent a great enter deal of time in her graduate year working in student government as deputy prime minister. Her day recognition for often ended at five or six p.m.

She helped organize the first Terry Fox golf tournament at the school, raising over \$3,000.

She attempted to formulate plans to erase the dichotomy between the spirit generated by the Blue Dragons and the school body. With the student government she helped plan activities for students of all ages. It was noted in the response to her application that her goal of school spirit separated her from other applicants.

She was also recognized for the example she has set in her commitment to excellence and the betterment of her community.

Kristina will use the Millennium scholarship and a \$2,711 Queen's entrance scholarship to defray some of the \$14,000 cost of her first year of university. During her time there she expects to volunteer at the hospital.
