Eight Generations of Cochranes in Cramahe Township

James Cochrane came to Canada from Wakefield, Yorkshire, England. It appears he was one of the sons of Lord Dundonald.

James settled in Cramahe Township, Lot 26, Concession 1, Broken Front. He was a gardener/farmer. In the early days on this lakeshore property, there was a "Halfway House", an establishment "half way" between Kingston and Toronto at which travellers stopped for food, refreshment, exchange of horses, etc.

James Cochrane married Mary E. Davis, born 1786 in Wexford County, Ireland. The couple had nine children, five of whom died in infancy or early childhood. Mary died in 1855 and is buried in the northeast section of Salem Cemetery. Her headstone is found there today. It is assumed James was also buried there although no stone remains attesting to this.

Re: Female Letter Carriers

To my knowledge, the Letter Carriers Union of Canada has always supported women mail carriers and I am sure that at this date there are many employed in this fashion. During the 1920s, when I lived on Robert Litster farm in Vernonville, a wonderful conscientious girl, Kittie Cochrane, brought the mail daily with horses and buggy.

At first she substituted for her father when his ill health kept him indoors and when he was incapable to make the Grafton-Vernonville daily run, she became responsible.

Rain/shine, Kittie could be depended upon and for many years she was a dedicated Government Employee. Not an easy task, but she served in noble fashion.

Another devoted Government Servant was my Grandfather David Deviney of Grafton. During a period of his life between 1895 and 1910, he served in the postal service of Cobourg and Grafton.

'He entered political life when he was elected to Cramahe Township school board in 1959. He later served on the township council for a period of 21 years, 17 as Reeve. He was elected Warden of Northumberland County just before his retirement from politics in 1980.
