## CJC expands water bottling operation in Port Hope

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CJC Bottling Limited will be hiring about 18 people to undertake a plastic bottle-making operation at its Peter Street, Port Hope manufacturing site this fall.

This new venture will be done in conjunction with a bottle-making supplier, says owner John Corcoran.

Both purified town water from the Port Hope municipal supply and spring-fed water transported from its Grafton well will eventually fill the new bottles, but at first it will be just town water using a reverse osmosis process.

Plans to make the plastic bottles were accelerated because the retail selling price of bottled water has dropped 40 per cent in this highly competitive market, he explained in an interview yesterday.

"We've prioritized this as a project."

The cost of transporting bottles is one that

could be eliminated by undertaking the bottle molding operation, he said.

Used manufacturing-line machinery was purchased last November but an evaluation is still ongoing to determine if it will be competitive enough, or if new machinery is required.

Once the line is up and running, about twothirds of bottles used by CJC Bottling will be made by its own employees.

That translates into about 7-million cases, added Mr. Corcoran.

While CJC Bottling, in partnership with Premier Water Canada, has begun bottled-water production at the new Port Hope plant this year, CJC is also in the midst of comprehensive plans to build a Vernonville plant which will replace the home plant located north of Grafton.

Securing a water-taking licence from the environment ministry at the new location, plus obtaining the necessary land-use planning changes from Alnwick Haldimand, are among the challenges to bringing the project to fruition.


The twinning of South Cramahe and Castleton Public Schools has brought with it some trepidation. Fears about the new principal can certainly be allayed.
