GRAFTON STAGE CURTAIN: AUTHORS ASSIST SAVING HISTORIC ICON

The scene is idyllic, a country home set in rolling hills, a wooden punt pulled up on the shore of a pond, shade trees scattered here and there. And for over 80 years, the vista has never changed.

It's an oil-on-canvas mural which serves as a backdrop for

Alnwick/Haldimand Township council and innumerable other community and private meetings and functions on the second floor of the Grafton Town Hall.

But the curtain is in need of restoration. Heritage Alnwick/Haldimand (HAH), the successor of the former Local Architectural Conservation Advisory Committee function premunicipal amalgamation, is stepping forward to oversee the pro-

The stage curtain was done by a Peterborough company by the name of Taylor, probably between 1900-1920. It is oil on canvas and rolls up. A fabrics consultant retained has reported that the canvas is in good condition, but the paint needs attention. HAH will now retain a painting consultant to advise on the conservation of the painting.

On August 10, noted Canadian authors Nino Ricci and Erika de Vasconcelos will be reading from

their works at a Save The Curtain Fundraiser at the Grafton Town Hall. Billed as a literary evening, the soiree includes wine and cheese reception from 7 to 7:30 p.m. followed by readings with musical interludes with jazz singer Arlene Smith, bassist Rick Homme and pianist Shelagh Pur-

The event sponsors are Royal LePage ProAlliance Realty and Barry and Sheila Surerus.

Ticket master Joanna Bonebakker says the \$25 per person tickets are selling quickly.

Tables of eight will be set up in the second floor theatre, with a maximum 96 people accommodated.

During the August 10 event, both authors will be available to sign copies of their latest books, Testament by Nino Ricci and My Darling Dead Ones by Erika De Vansconcelos.

The authors are weekend residents of Alnwick/Haldimand Township.
